
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



## year <sup>-</sup>


In Year 1, the children have been busy engaging with their new topic 'The Enchanted Forest'. In English, we have been learning about different styles of writing by becoming immersed in our topic and retelling traditional fairy tales. We are excited to begin exploring fractured fairy tales next week.

As part of this topic, we have had some very

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exciting provision activities available. We have had Lowther Fairies who came to visit. The children were busy writing messages to the

messages to the fairies and even receiving tiny messages back to read!







## Year 2

In Year 2 we have been exploring 'Heroes and

Villains'. We thought about what it means to



be a hero or a villain and discussed people through History that would fit these headings. We have used positive reflection times to think about what these amazing people have done for us and how they have changed the lives of so many. In Maths we have been learning about addition and subtraction. The children have used tens frames, number lines and

hundred squares to solve number sentences and have applied their learning when reasoning and

problem solving.

To tie together our Fire of London unit, the children planned, designed and made their

own fabulous fire engines; making great use of the awesome woodwork bench in our outside learning area. The children have been working hard in Phonics- particularly on

blending tricky split digraphs!
They all completed their Phonics Screening



Check earlier in the week and totally smashed it! Finally roll up, roll up to Roller Disco Club... How could we not mention it?! What a huge success- the children are loving every minute

of it!



In Year 3 we have been busy learning about our new science topic of Rocks and Soils. We are learning new, adventurous vocabulary and now understand what tricky scientific words such as sedimentary, metamorphic and igneous mean. This half term, we have become real geographers and are putting our skills to the test to find out all we can about earthquakes and what causes them to occur. We have linked this learning into our English and ICT topics, where we have begun to create an information text Earthquakes. used We researching skills to gather and collect information and create appropriate subheadings under which we can record and document our findings.



We have begun to plan our new project, where we will be using embroidery and sewing skills to create something special. We are continuing enjoy mastering addition and subtraction

maths. Our skills in netball are coming along nicely, and we will be soon ready to

play some inter year matches to showcase great teamwork.



## Year 4

We have been incredibly busy in Year 4! The children have truly thrown themselves into our Geography topic of Rainforests this term. Initially we focused on where rainforests are located in the world, their climate, and the creatures that call these areas home. We then

> delved deeper into why rainforests are so important, what deforestation is, and its causes. We have linked our Geography learning closely to our English and Art/DT units where the children have been creating balanced arguments and creative pieces, alongside looking indigenous art and creating our own sculptures using natural resources. The leaf-bowl sculptures are truly stunning and the children are really looking forward to bringing them



home and giving them to someone special!

Maths we have been consolidating understanding of the foundations of Maths, with place value, addition and subtraction and now multiplication as our focus areas. Year 4 have been working hard to try different methods and are on their way to becoming timestables superstars!

Finally we have been lucky enough to have had two themed days and a visit so far this term! We took part in the wonderful Roald Dahl Day alongside Year 3 and celebrated our Rainforests topic with a brilliant 'Rainforest Day' at the end of October. We also had a fantastic visit from the CLC who came last week to run

an ICT workshop on robotics. The children were amazing and loved programming and controlling their very own robots. What a term we've had already! Bring on Christmas!





## Year 5

What a start to the year for Year 5! In History, we studied Ancient Greek, discussing the validity of the Trojan Horse story as well as learning about Greek gods and goddesses, democracy and myths and legends. We have now turned to the Ancient Mayans, where we have



already learnt about Chichen Itza, what modern Mayans are doing and we have become archaeologists, working out what the lost cities were used for.

Our English work tied in well with History, as the study of Greek myths and legends got the year off to a flying start. We used a playscript to act out the story of Theseus and the Minotaur and read a number of other classic myths.

Stories play a big part of our work on speaking and listening, and the children heard a professional storyteller recount the tale of Icarus and Daedalus before telling the story themselves. They produced their own myths which was celebrated in our first "Phase Write-off" of the year, with a pupil from each Year 5 class being chosen to read out their myth to an audience. The writing was of an exceptional quality.

We have also studied the classic picture book Way Home by Libby Hathorn and Gregory Rogers, developed our Instruction writing skills and begun work on A Christmas Carol by Charles Dickens. The Autumn English programme is a full one but the children have responded with great enthusiasm and are making excellent progress.

In Maths, we have moved on from Place Value into Multiplication and Division. Year 5 have shown an excellent understanding of factors, multiples, prime,



square and cube numbers, and have now moved on to multiplying and dividing by 10, 100 and 1000. They are smashing the Year 5 curriculum!

## Year 6

This month in Year 6 we have been learning about Anne Frank and the Holocaust, researching her life and writing her biography. The children have enjoyed this topic and we have shared many interesting

discussions. In maths, we have been learning to multiply and divide fractions, and apply this learning in a range of contexts.



As part of our wider curriculum learning, we have been using

Micro:Bits to code different applications, learning about the Silk Road in geography



and constructing electrical circuits to explain how they function. We look forward to hosting our Enterprise Fair on Monday 14th December, where Year 6 will be selling the products they have made in their mini-businesses!
