Special feature on life in Year 6 and life after Lowther for our pupils

Parents often ask where children go on to from Lowther, when they leave in Year 6? In this feature you'll be able to see the range of schools that children move on to when they "graduate" Lowther. Children at Lowther do very well and so go on to a wide variety of secondary schools. Most stay in the state sector but many sit entrance exams for selective schools.

Children from Lowther have gone on to the following state schools over the last few years:

Richmond Park Academy, Christ's, Grey Court, Wes London Free, Burlington Danes, Chiswick, Richmond upon Thames School, Ark Putney and Lady Margaret's.


In the selective system, children from Lowther have either gone on to, or had offers from, the following schools: Ibstock, Harrodian, St Paul's Girls, The Oratory, Emmanuel, Latymer and Godolphin, Putney High, Latymer Upper, Wimbledon Park, Lady Eleanor Holles, Tiffin and Kingston Grammar amongst others These places include ones offered as full scholarships or bursaries as well as fee-paying places.

At Lowther we believe our job is to ensure children are well set up and prepared for the next step in their education, wherever that may be. Our children are successful because they work hard, have a fantastic attitude, enjoy school and are well taught. Feedback from parents indicates that pupils from Lowther leave in Year 6 as confident, socially adept individuals with a positive attitude to school and to learning.

How well do children do at Lowther?

At this time of year secondary school offers are being made and children in Year 6 prepare to take their SATs tests. Consequentially, I thought it would be helpful for parents to share how well pupils at Lowther do academically.

The table to the left shows the academic results from last year (2017) for pupils in Year 6—the children's last year of primary school. As you can see, pupils from Lowther achieved very well and our results were higher than the national average in all areas.

In Richmond, the primary schools are of an exceptional standard, so much so that Richmond normally tops the charts nationally for the performance of their primary schools. Each of those schools is different in its make up and Lowther is certainly quite different in it's demographic to most Richmond Schools, A simple example of that difference is the percentage of children that speak another language. Nationally it is 20% in Richmond it is 20%, whilst at Lowther it is 38%. Lowther more than holds its own with the highperforming schools as you can see from the set of 3 graphs. These graphs show the average scaled score of pupils at Lowther compared to their peers in other Richmond schools. Lowther children perform very well and we sit comfortably in the middle of the 65 primary schools in Richmond and Kingston.

We're very proud of how well our children perform academically and this years Year 6 are currently working super hard to ensure they get the results they deserve (And of course try and beat last years Year 6!)
