### Have Your Say About Richmond State Secondary Schools

Our children deserve to receive the very best education. We are in an area of London where school standards are very high, this does however mean that there is an increasing demand for school places in the locality. A significant number of parents are working hard to try and ensure there is a great choice for every family. Do take the time to read through the information below.

Richmond Council is currently making a series of decisions about the secondary school system in the borough which will affect all the children currently at primary school. This is in response to the combination of high birth rates and greatly improved GCSE results across the borough, leading to a shortfall in secondary school places, so this decision will have widespread implications

On 13th September Richmond Council held a debate (webcast available <a href="www.richmond.public-i.tv/core/portal/home">www.richmond.public-i.tv/core/portal/home</a>) in which the inclusive school petition was presented that asked the Council "to ensure that every state-funded school opening in the borough from now on is inclusive, so that no child can be denied a place in a good local school because of the religion or belief of their parents". Over 2000 people from across the community have supported it, with beliefs ranging from the non-religious to Anglicans, Muslims, Hindus, Jews and Catholics, including parents and senior figures from borough schools. It is important that the Council hears the views of as many of the borough's parents as possible as it's our families that will be directly affected. There are currently two petitions underway: one supporting the Council's plan to provide a Catholic voluntary-aided catholic school, and the other requesting instead that the new secondary school should be open to all.
