

We have to crowdfund some of the funds to show the Mayor our community is actively engaged with this project. We are hoping for lots of support by sharing and liking our page <u>Vine Rd Project</u>, <u>Engaging the</u> <u>Community (spacehive.com)</u>, commenting, offering to share skills and volunteering, and of course making a pledge if you can, this can be as little as £2 – every single pledge counts!

With this funding we hope to test some elements of the Master Plan this summer, including a temporary pump track for skate boarders, scooters and rollerbladers to enjoy. 
We hope this project will give our community a little something to look forward to this summer as restrictions are lifted and we begin to return to normalcy.



Nursery

In the Nursery we have been busy learning about lots of different things. We finished our topic about 'People Who Help Us' by having a Fire station in our role play area.

The Nursery children spent some time talking about Chinese New Year as this was especially relevant to 2 children in the morning Nursery group. James and Lyra stood up in front of their friends and explained about



'cleaning all the rooms in the house. This gets rid of all the old germs and dirt ready for the New Year'. "We will have new clothes and some will be red because that is an important colour for us. We are going to have some special food".



The children in Nursery helped to make some stir fried vegetables with noodles in a sauce. We watched some Dragon Dancing and were surprised how easily the Dragons dance up in the air on posts! We did some Dragon Dancing of our own using a scarf to dance under.

The weather has been good so we have played outside. Some of the children learnt how to spin 2 hoops around on their arms.

We are still learning about rhyming and have enjoyed reading 'Green Eggs and Ham' by Dr Seuss. Martha bought her copy into the Nursery for us to read.



Reception

Reception have continued to blow us away with their incredible resilience and great attitudes to online learning this month. We are so proud of them all! We began the month by learning about the different sorts of transport that we can find in our local area. The children went on their own transport walks

and then created maps to show the route that they took. We then learned all about the festival of Chinese New Year. The children enjoyed reading the story of the Great Race and looking at the different ways that Chinese New Year is celebrated. They decorated their own houses with lanterns





and door decorations and then created their own Chinese dragons to dragon dance with! Reception finished the month by celebrating

Pancake Day. We read the story of the 'Runaway Pancake', retold it using our own puppets and story maps and then had a go at making

some pancakes of our own. Delicious!

Making pancakes was not the only opportunity that Reception had to work on their cooking skills this month. Each week Chef Sarah wrote some incredible recipes that the children were able to read them all by themselves. After seeing some of the delicious scones,

carrot cake muffins and vegetable noodles that were made we think that the children might be returning to us as professional chefs!

The children have continued to work hard on their maths skills this month and have learned some different strategies to add and subtract numbers. They have also worked hard



to learn new digraphs and tricky words in their phonics sessions and are becoming quite confident readers.



We are really looking forward to returning to school next month and spending lots of time working with our friends. We are also going to be learning about growing and the celebration of Easter- we cannot wait!

Year ⁻

This month in Year 1 in Maths, we have been primarily learning about place value. The children have been identifying patterns on number grids, comparing numbers and amounts, discussing place value and numerical order, and working hard on some problem solving and reasoning challenges. They have also been developing skills in counting in twos, fives and tens which led to many children playing shops and trying to solve problems using coins.

In English, both classes have been exploring the story 'Charlie's Super Hero Underpants'. This was a

vehicle to work on some picture sequencing challenges, verbal retelling of the story in the correct order, planning and finally retelling the story as a written narrative following their plan. The children are continuing to work on Phase 5 phonics and are developing skills segmenting more challenging words now in their writing. It is great to see children using their word mats and toolkits to help them with reading and spelling trickier words.



In R.E., the children have listened to the story of Saint Valentine and discovered why and how people celebrate today. This ties into our over-arching R.E. question this half term, "What makes a special day?". The Children were then making their own Valentine's crafts and cards to post to family or friends.

Our P. E. also links closely to this 'Special Day' theme as we have developed our skills in dance. The children have been finding out how to do a Chinese Lion and Dragon Dance as part of our Chinese New Year celebrations. The children have also been listening to some Chinese music, thinking about the beats and the speed of the dance and learning a



sequence of movements put together with music.

Year 1 have been super busy in many other areas of the curriculum too, including looking at seasonal changes and the effects of the current season on plants in Science; learning about rhythm, un -tuned percussion instruments and reading crotchets, quavers and

rests in Music; and studying colour wheels and use of colour in Art.

Yet again, we have been so impressed by the children's perseverance during this tricky time and we look forward to the challenges and excitement of the new term together.

Year 2

In February we have had loads of fun and it is fair to say it has been jam-packed with learning! In Maths we started off the term learning about statistics. We were blown away with the children's understanding of charts and diagrams and their creativity when it came to creating their own. After this we moved on to explore Multiplication. The children have been brilliant at making

equal groups and creating arrays as well as making doubles and comparing multiplication facts. We have now started to look at division and exploring sharing and grouping. We are really excited to be starting our new theme for this half term - all about 'Antarctica'. We're currently filling ourselves with knowledge about the region and using some



creative writing techniques to describe the landscape there. When we return to school we will be immersing ourselves in the March of the Penguins, so look out for some fact files, our own explanation text and writing a



story about an emperor penguin. We can't wait to get started with lots of creative activities such as a penguin dance sequence and experimenting with different paint techniques to create a penguin themed masterpiece!

We have also started our new

Gymnastics unit focussing on jumps and balances and combining these skills to create simple sequences with a clear beginning and end. We can't wait to get back into school and start to practise our sequences incorporating partner work and apparatus.

In science we will be investigating Antarctic food chains, learning about how polar animals have adapted to survive in such harsh environments, making habitat

models and conducting some investigations all about ice and icebergs! As geographers we will be investigating different climate zones around the world, naming continents and oceans and then taking an in depth look at the physical and human features of Polar Regions.



Year 3

In year 3 we kicked off the month learning all about the Chinese New Year. The children did a fantastic job at continuing to develop their speaking and listening skills by writing, editing and re-telling the story in their own words.



In Art and D&T the children drew and created puppets of all the animals in the story. The children displayed their dramatic talents by dressing up in costume to re-tell the story of how the Chinese New Year came about. You can check out these videos on our google classroom- we think they are great!


We have come back after our break well rested and this half term in English, we have started our fair trade project, learning all about where the food we eat comes from and how it gets to the shelves in the



supermarket. With it coming up to Easter, we thought it a good idea to learn about where chocolate comes from and are busy writing explanation texts to share our knowledge with others. We have kicked off our multiplication topic in

maths and Year 3 have certainly shown what amazing

mathematicians they all are. We have just started our new unit in Science- Plants! We can't wait to begin to see all the trees begin to blossom over the next few weeks :)



Year 4

Remote Learning continues to go at full speed in Year 4! I have been so impressed by how the children have handled this lockdown period, maintaining such a positive outlook and excellent work ethic as they mastered the ins and outs of Google Classroom.

In English we have been working on a variety of writing styles and working on improving and stretching our vocabulary with the children producing some marvellous instruction writing, newspaper articles and now trying their hand at formal letters. In Maths, we have continued to work on multiplication, focusing on



perfecting our recall of those trickier times tables and also looking at different written methods. We have now moved on to a focus on division, looking at both mental and written methods. Division is not the easiest of mathematical operations to master, but the children have really embraced the challenge! Once we are back in school our next topic will be fractions.

Once again, the support from parents during this difficult



Lockdown period has been nothing short of amazing and very much appreciated by both

me and the Year 4 TA team. We are so excited to all be together again on the 8th March – the countdown is officially on! Until then, keep up the excellent work Year4 – you're fantastic!

Year 6 have been outstanding in their home learning this term and we are so proud of them!

Attendance and engagement have been 100% and we have seen fantastic attitudes from all of the children. In our English learning, we researched and wrote non-chronological information texts about Natural Disasters. We really enjoyed discovering how volcanoes are formed and the damage they can cause, as well as how important they are for our global ecosystem. All of our excellent research and investigating was used in designing and building our own websites about disasters too! We considered the content, design and usability of websites to create our own pages where you can explore, watch and learn all about hurricanes, tornadoes and other natural disasters!

In science, we have been learning about the importance of diet and exercise to keep our bodies in a healthy condition. We investigated the different food groups and the importance of a balanced diet, and also the negative effects that some drugs and alcohol can have on bodies and our their internal systems.




In maths, we have learnt about measurements and how to area calculate the and of different perimeter

compound shapes. We have applied our learning to a range of quadrilaterals while calculating the



perimeter, area and volume of these. This learning was further explored in identifying shapes that have the same area but different perimeters, and vice versa.
