Our children's centres are places where all families with children under 5 years, expectant mothers and fathers, can go to help their children to get the best start in life.


#### Our aims

### Attendance Update!


The language we use for school attendance is a "minimum expectation of 96%". We expect all children to have excellent attendance at Lowther. Indeed, it's one of Top 5 school priorities this year. At the moment attendance is lower than our expectation. This is disappointing, but we do understand this is also similar to the overall national picture of attendance, which is around 93%, which is lower than normal. The reasons for this nationally are well-documented. We will be striving to increase these figures with your support in 2022.





## Nursery

last few weeks and until the half term break we have enjoyed focusing on our Nursery Adults favourite stories. We have done lots of activities linked to them. We have read Shark in the Park. Each Peach Pear Plum and Snake Supper so far and have Dear Zoo and the Gruffalo for the last 2 weeks. We made telescopes and went for a walk around the school to spot sharks! We made mini puppets with the characters from Each



Peach Pear Plum and are starting to make snakes from Snake Supper. We have exciting activities planned for the last 2 books.

We have been cooking Cheese and Parsley scones this half term. The children have cooked in small groups and only the chefs took home scones, this has been character building for the other children!



The children have been doing lots of mark making especially of their names. We have done tracing with some children now doing a recognisable form of their name independently.

The creative area has been very popular with children now able to ask for resources that they would like to use but have run out in the drawers.

The children really enjoyed playing with the magnets in the Nursery, finding what was and was not magnetic.

We discovered that not everything that looks like metal really is.



## Reception

January has been a very busy month for us in Reception. We hit the ground running in 2022 learning about the season of Winter. We went on a Winter walk to the allotment where we lit a fire to inspire thinking of vocabulary linked to Winter. On very cold mornings, we loved finding ice and inspecting frost with magnifying glasses.

Next up, we started our first topic of 2022 'Animals'. We used the story Owl Babies as a stimulus for the topic, reading the story a little at a time. We began by looking at the front cover and first page in a dark room with woodland sounds! The children blew our socks off with the brilliant words they used to describe the owlets feelings when their mummy went and returned! After



writing mummy owl a letter, she made a visit to our classroom! We learnt how to navigate a tablet to take pictures of the clues she left.

Shortly after this, we got stuck into planning our very first Screen Your Story competition. We used the theme 'Saving the Planet' to investigate problems our woodlands face. The children then planned a story thinking of a character, problem and a way to save the day. We may be a little biased but we think Receptions stories are the BEST!





Our maths learning has kept us on our toes, starting the month learning about zero and comparing numbers to 5. We moved onto comparing mass and capacity. A definite highlight was making balance scale cupcakes. Yes Chefs! Back

to number learning we explored the numbers 6,7 and 8.

In PE, our focus has been and will continue to be developing confidence in fundamental movements. Experience jumping, sliding, rolling moving over and under apparatus and develop coordination and gross motor skills.



We finished the month learning about, preparing for and celebrating the festival of Chinese New Year. More to follow in next month's edition!



## Jear

This has already been a very busy term for everyone and the children have loved our topic 'Superheroes'!

In English, we are very excited to be part of the Screen your Story competition again this year. The children have been working hard to develop their skills in writing adjectives, using tenses and suffixes to really make their stories shine! The children have now created some incredible stories about amazing Super Hero rescues around the world. The theme this year is Save the Planet and so the Super Hero characters in their stories have been saving the world from forest

fires, pollution and logging!

In Maths, the children have been working on developing the understanding of place value. They have partitioning numbers into tens and ones and using part whole models to solve problems.

We have been especially children's computing skills this term.

The children have been learning to code and have been programming a character to make it dance. This has meant they have needed to practise their hand-eye coordination skills and have learnt to drag and drop using a mouse

Well done Year 1 for very successful another month!



## **Year 2**

During January we have been really busy learning lots of new things in Year 2.

In history, we've started a new topic learning all about what happened to the Titanic. We have been searching photographs for clues about life 100 years ago and have really enjoyed making predictions about why Delia will need a new hat for her journey. We have carried the 'hats' theme into our DT work and have been investigating the different styles and purposes of hats.

We have also started learning some sewing techniques and have put them to good use in designing and making

a hat for our teddy bears.

In English, we have been thinking about the difference between fiction and nonfiction texts and have got stuck into writing our own non-chronological reports.

In Maths, we have been exploring multiplication and division and have worked on developing our 2, 5 and 10 times tables.

Science has also been a hit learning all about animals. We have been classifying animals and have thought about the six main animal groups; Reptiles, Amphibians, Mammals, Fish, Birds and Insects. It's all go in Year 2!





## Year 3

Year 3 started this year with a fun-filled day at the **science museum**. We had a fabulous time there, learning practically in the wonder lab, and being shown a number of different experiments. We also watched a science presentation about explosions, which were very loud and exciting to watch! Year 3 were brilliantly behaved throughout, and thoroughly enjoyed their day.

Computing- Children in Year 3 have begun learning how to create codes using the Logo j2code program. They have used programming language to create specific shapes, such as squares and rectangles, and used their creativity to create more complex drawings, such as houses or cars. This unit also allows the children to practise maths vocabulary, such as left, right, forward and explores degrees of turning. They are beginning to use word commands to direct the object along a given path and must debug their code if the code does not produce the desired outcome.

Screen Your Story and The Iron Man-children have been creating, planning and writing their own stories. We have written a story about saving the world, where we learnt lessons about the impact waste is having on our planet. Then, we started our new English topic, Iron Man, in which we created our own characters based on Iron Man, and have planned, written and edited our own stories.

**Maths**- We have delved deeper into Multiplication and Division this term, with Year 3 learning their times tables, and now beginning to multiply and divide 2 digit numbers by 1, using a formal written method, and concrete resources to support our progress.

History topic- Bronze Age- In history, we have moved from the Stone Age into the Bronze Age. We have already recognised the social changes that resulted in this historical change, and we will continue to develop our knowledge of this topic, understanding the importance of monuments, both historically and currently and understanding Bronze Age ceremonies and their significance. We are excited to teach this new topic to Year 3!





## Year 4

Learning has got off to a good start in Year 4 this month! The children have really settled into Year 4 life and it has been lovely to see them embracing new topics and challenges.

In English they are on the way to becoming the next generation of best-selling authors and environmentalists, building some truly fantastic stories about saving the planet!

In Maths, we have continued our work on multiplication, focusing on perfecting our recall of those trickier times tables through lots of different methods. The children are doing an excellent job of challenging themselves and trying their hand at some of our weird and wonderful methods – like times table themed karaoke!

In the wider curriculum we have started Swimming every week and our first History topic of the year – the Romans! The children have enjoyed the range of the topic - one week looking at sources and historical evidence, the next designing a Roman Shield and finding out what it would be like to be a real Roman soldier.

In Science, we have moved on to electricity, with all the fun of creating circuits and experimenting with different materials, and in R.E. we have been learning about Sikhism and the 5 K's.

It has been a packed term already – and it's only the end of January! Keep up the excellent learning Year 4!





## Year 5

Year 5 have been learning about fractions and decimals in Maths, helped by the use of some post-Christmas Terry's Chocolate Oranges. With 20 segments per orange, combining two of them offered an ideal way of demonstrating improper fractions and also managed to sharpen the focus in the classroom to impressive levels... Using physical resources is an important part of the White Rose maths scheme which the school follows and that, together with the pictorial and the abstract, has helped the children to gain an impressive understanding of fractions and decimals. Later in the term we will move on to percentages and learn how to combine all three systems.

In English, we paused our study of The Highwayman to take part in the Screen Your Story competition, with a concentrated focus on writing. The children responded enthusiastically to the theme of Saving the Planet, and applied themselves well to researching, planning, drafting and editing their 500-word stories. The standard was high and there looked to be a number of possible winners among the class entries, so we will look forward eagerly to hearing the results in the spring.

We have begun to learn about classifying, mixing and separating materials in Science, as well as taking part in the Big Garden Birdwatch for homework, and have produced some fabulous murals in Art to tie in with our study of the Mayan civilisation in History.

## **Year 6**

Year 6 have been fantastic in their start to the 2022 Spring Term. We have written very well-researched discussion texts, asking: Is there too much technology in our lives today? Children

surveyed friends and family and used this evidence to present the positive and negative aspects of technology in our lives. Overall, we agreed that technology was very important and - if not overused - a huge positive. In science, we have been learning about the circulatory system and exploring the role of the heart and lungs. We have seen how the pulmonary system functions and helps us breathe, and the important role



that blood plays in keeping us alive and healthy. We look forward to conducting our circulatory dissections very soon!



In maths, we have learnt about the relationship between fractions, decimals and percentages exploring this through 'Chocolate Percentage Challenge'. We have been calculatina percentages of increasingly difficult amounts while consolidating our place value knowledge and working toward a thorough understanding of equivalences between the three. We are now

moving on to our measurement topic, exploring unit equivalents and have successfully applied this learning to real-life problem solving scenarios.

Our first trip of the year was to the excellent Design Museum; giving us a great insight into the role technology has played in our lives, and importantly, the materials and resources we have used to create them during this century and the last.

Using this experience, together with our learning in both our previous electricity topic in science and our programming skills - and our knowledge of Boolean Gates - in Computing we created our very own working reaction games. We then designed the exterior as a further extension to a highly successful DT project.

#### General School Matters

At the start of the new year I thought I'd mention

a couple of things we're noticing with uniform and other matters - please do note these core expectations.

Uniform matters:

- NO Lowther sports hoodies to be worn to school please these are just for PE lessons in the winter months.
- ALL uniform (including coats and hats) to be named please. I find a lot of unnamed jumpers and coats around school.
- Footwear remains the main issue with incorrect uniform.
- NO boots to be worn at school.
- No jewellery is allowed at school (except stud earrings).
- No shoes with logos that are not in black.

Please note ALL packed lunch boxes should be stored carefully (before and after use). We also politely request that plastic bags are NOT used for packed lunches as this isn't in line with our school's attempts to minimise our use of single use plastics. Before and after school

- NO ball games (unless at a sports club)
- Children should not use the swing and the other climbing frame equipment at this time.
- NO scooting or cycling on school grounds for safety reasons please.
