
Reception

Another month means more amazing learning from the children in Reception!

We began the month by learning about St George's Day. We heard the story of George and the dragon, and then worked together to plan a big St George's Day party. We made scones, cakes, sandwiches and decorations, and then wrote invitations to invite Mr Bracken and Mr

Tuffney to celebrate with us. It was a brilliant afternoon!

We then moved on to learning about traditional tales. We began by reading Goldilocks, and the children were incredibly shocked to discover that she had come into our classrooms and made a terrible mess! They wrote 'wanted' posters and stuck them around the school to make sure that people knew that she was around and causing trouble. We then read the story of the Three Little Pigs. The children retold the story using story maps, and then added their own imaginative twist by changing the character and the setting. We were very impressed with how creative the stories were! We finished the month by learning all about the Muslim celebration of Eid. The children make Eid biscuits, cards and decorations and Ms Zahra painted their hands with mehndi.

Year ⁻

We have had a busy half term studying our Animals around the World topic. In English, the children have been using non-fiction books to investigate endangered



animals. In Science, we have been observing life cycles and Animal Kingdoms. We have been caring for some American Robin Moths which have laid their own eggs. The caterpillars have hatched and are now growing fast! In P.E., the children have been working

with Miss. Kiri to create a spectacular animal dance which we have shared on google classroom. In Maths, the children have been working on Fractions. They have been developing an understanding of cutting objects, pictures and quantities into halves and quarters.

In addition to these busy activities, we also had an amazing visit from some real birds of prey this week. The children were able to find out about British birds of prey, watch how their handlers use whistles to call for

them and watch as they swooped over our heads! In cooking, Chef Sarah and Chef Claire have been taking the children in groups to cook lots of wonderful cakes and biscuits.

As part of our R.E. learning this half term about celebrations, we have looked in depth into how people celebrate Ramadan and Eid. As a Key stage we showed what we had learned by having a



spectacular Eid party in school.



Year 2

What a busy month May has been in Year 2. We have investigated many different homes and habitats, become Caribbean explorers, published authors and wildlife experts!

Having researched, drafted and published some amazing information books about British woodland creatures we're currently becoming Julia Donaldson experts. We really enjoyed reading lots of her books last week and are now writing her biography, making comparisons between her stories and choosing our favourite to write a book review.



In geography we have thoroughly enjoyed studying life in St Lucia and investigated the similarities and differences between Barnes and Soufriere. Denise has show us around her island, informed us of the key human and physical features of St Lucia and tested our map work skills through both Ordnance Survey and Google Earth techniques. We're planning to take a local walk around Barnes to investigate our own human and physical features after the half term (having been rained off this week!) Our final humanities topic of the year will see us answer the question 'What do we find where the land meets the sea?' where we

will be investigating coasts and learning how to use four figure grid references to explore maps. Our RE topic has seen us learn what make a good teacher or leader and have investigated some leaders and teachers in our community.

As scientists we have really got to grips with why animals live in different habitats and how their survival relies on the conditions in which they live. We have extended our life processes learning from animals and into humans - Mr T even helped us investigate the question 'Do we get faster as we get older?' last week. (Don't tell anyone, but he didn't do very well!) Our final science unit next half term will see us plant, observe and compare different seeds and bulbs and their optimal growing conditions.



We have loved showing off our dance moves to Miss Mason and learning some new steps! We have learnt 2 dance routines this term and have continued to develop sequences considering levels, direction and spacing. We have also been developing our ball control skills and have learnt to pass accurately and dribble a ball.

It is sad to think that the final half term has come upon us so quickly, but we have some real treats to look forward to! We are really looking forward to tasting, designing and making pizzas, planting a range of seeds and bulbs, investigating coasts and we're even hoping to take a trip together before the end of the year!



Year 3

This month has flown by in year 3! We have been busy working on our writing skills and creating some excellent Egyptian stories, full of suspense and tension. The children have impressed with their use of personification and other descriptive devices to help bring their story to life.

In maths, we have begun to look at fractions and are looking forward to deepening our knowledge and understanding of this area of the maths curriculum throughout the next half term also.





Over the past month, many celebrated Eid and we also shared in these celebrations in year 3, decorating our corridors and learning all about the festival of Eid and the Islam religion.

In science, we have loved learning all about how the plants around us grow. We have enjoyed learning about all the different parts of the life cycle of a plant from germination to seed dispersal and we, the teachers, have loved seeing and hearing about the children's trips to the Isabella Plantation to explore a wider range of botanical beauty.

Our history topic, the Egyptians, has taken us back in time. We are loving learning all about the different ways that the Egyptians lived and the traditions that they upheld. We will continue to look at this next half

term and soon be expert Egyptologists.



Throughout the half term we have been getting ready for sports day, learning and perfecting different athletic skills during our P.E lessons.

Year 4

And just like that it's May! The children have really settled back into school life as we head towards the final part of the year.

In English, we have continued our work on Varjak Paw, further developing our inference and comprehension skills, alongside looking at the features of play scripts and having a go at writing our own. We have also been combining our English learning with Computing and Science as we research and put together our own information booklets on digestion.

In Maths, alongside our continuing work to improve the fluency of our timestables, we have been working hard on decimals. We have been working on our understanding of what a



decimal is, ordering decimals using place value, rounding decimals and converting to decimals from fractions! As I write we begin our transition from decimals to money.



In the wider curriculum the children have had lots of opportunities to develop their artistic skills, producing some beautiful mixed media pieces whilst in Science they have learnt about all things digestion!

Finally we have been working hard on our Year 4 Original Play/Film this half term! The children have been rehearsing and learning lines and filming starts imminently! I have been really impressed with their efforts and I'm sure you will be too!

I am so looking forward to things opening up even more and spending a fantastic final half term with fantastic Year 4!

Year 5

Year 5 have been scaling new heights in our Mountains topic, as we learned about George Mallory and Sandy Irvine's expedition to the world's highest peak in 1924, as well as Tenzing Norgay and Sir Edmund Hillary's successful climb to the summit of Mount Everest 29 years later (pictures below).



In English we have written recounts as diary entries, changed a text from the first to the third person and used drama to reenact the final moments of the fateful 1924 expedition. Geography, we are developing our understanding of local mountain ranges and learning how they differ from others, while in Art we have used charcoal to create some dramatic mountain skylines. We have been impressed with the pupils' enthusiasm for this topic, and they have shown this with

some excellent and imaginative home learning.

In Maths, we have begun studying geometry. Year 5 have been identifying and measuring angles, and are now drawing their own using protractors. We will be moving into polygon recognition, and seeing how we can identify different triangles and quadrilaterals.

Our Science topic has moved on to Living Things and Their Habitats, and we have been learning about reproduction in flowering plants. The children particularly enjoyed dissecting liles and identifying the



parts of the flower they had been learning about.

We have also been enjoying some exciting Computing



lessons, designing and creating our own websites and using micro:bits to measure temperature (pictures below). We have again been so impressed with the way the children have conducted themselves in these lessons and it has been great to see them using the new Chromebooks so enthusiastically and responsibly. They really are having a great year!

Year 6

. Year 6 have had another busy and successful month, completing their end-of-year SATs with amazing attitudes and determination. We are so proud of all the children in the year group, who demonstrated huge resilience and maturity to showcase the progress and incredible learning that has taken place during their time at Lowther. Well done to all of the children in Year 6!

In the wider curriculum, we have been learning about the British Empire and the History of Medicine. The children have greatly enjoyed investigating primary and secondary sources to examine how Britain came to have such a large empire, what this meant and what happened to the empire. In History of Medicine, we have learnt about how life expectancy has

changed so drastically in the past 250 years, the causes and effects of the Great Plague and are beginning to research the important medical milestones of the past centuries, including penicillin and the smallpox children vaccine. The are identifying the clear parallels to the current pandemic, and this



has proved a fruitful area for discussion and debate!

In computing, we have been exploring our maths topic of shape further with the use of direction language and angles using scratch; programmed with HTML & CSS to send our own ecards and coded Micro:bits with our own tunes!

Our science topic - Classification - has led to interesting research and investigation into different organisms and microorganisms, and we are currently observing the growth of mould on bread using different variables! We have enjoyed learning about animal groups, and how they can be classified and sorted according to their characteristics and variations. Did you know a platypus is a mammal that can lay eggs and has a poisonous claw on its foot!

Now that restrictions have lifted slightly, we were pleased to visit Holly Lodge in Richmond Park, where we focused on British history and within that, our local history. Richmond Park was incredibly important during WW1; it was the location of a South African hospital, the site of new war invention testing as well as providing valuable allotments for growing food. It was very hands-on and we took full advantage of their unique historical

classroom, pharmacy and kitchen garden to find out about this local resource!

We are looking forward to a very busy end to the year - including camping, cycling, the Y6 show and of course the Isle of Wight! Phew! Have a great half term:)

London has so many fantastic things to do with your children right on your doorstep. Here are a few some of us on the team recommend you checking out.

Mr. Tuffney recommends



I love this place (Wildwood Adventure) just down the A3 in Guildford. It's a great challenge for children and adults alike. Wild Kids is fun for all the family, but primarily aimed at children aged between 6 and 12 years. It strikes a nice balance of being easy enough to be fun, tricky enough for a sense of achievement. Bridges, logs, zips from tree to tree, cargo nets, wobbly things, climbing wall traverse and more. For the older children there's a great , more advanced, challenging course too. If your children like climbing and taking on challenges Wildwood may be worth checking out.

Mrs Cox recommends



Garson's Farm in Esher is a great place to take the children. They can explore the fields and pick their own fruit. **Mrs Cox** also recommends Paddle boarding on Wimbledon Park lake, Blueberry picking at the Avalong Garden Centre and Mayfield Lavender Farm just down the road in Banstead.

Mr Ripley recommends



Richmond Park is a National Nature Reserve and deer park with 630 Red and Fallow deer roaming freely. We all know it's on our doorstep to we actually make use of it's amazing space. It's great fun to explore the park, spotting the deer and taking the opportunity to perhaps build a den or go on a nature hunt or a family walk.

Other recommendations



Lots of the teachers recommended Battersea Park. It has a riverside promenade, a large lake, many notable trees and ecological areas, children's play areas, a children's zoo, the Pump House gallery, ceremony venue and sports facilities. It also has a Go Ape and, of course, the recumbent bikes (which if you've never tired you should!)

During the day I am going to be working with groups of children from Year 5 during the day and other teachers will be taking their classes out for short periods to help too. It should be a great day.


Year 6 Relay

Hammersmith Bridge Update



- The crossing will take 1 minute 30
- The cost is the same as if you were taking a bus journey
- The aim is to try and get the service up and running by the end of September (though this is thought to be ambitious)

Last week I was invited to attend an update for schools on the Hammersmith Bridge situation. Whilst things seem to be taking forever there does seem to be some light at the end of the tunnel. The ferry is expecting to go ahead, and whilst not a replacement for the bridge, it will offer that important connection for Barnes to Hammersmith. Here's hoping I have further positive updates to give you soon.

The proposed timetable has been designed to deliver a reliable and punctual service.

06:00 - 22:00 on weekdays 08:00 - 22:00 at weekends

1,116 passenger movements per hour during peak times

(a passenger movement =1 crossing in either direction)

Weekday peak services will operate using two vessels from 06:00 - 10:00 and 15:00 - 19:00 in both directions

Frequency between 5-7 minutes in both directions The weekday peak service will operate using two vessels

Off peak

- 620 passenger movements per hour during off-peak periods (a passenger movement =1 crossing in either direction)
- Weekday off-peak services will operate using one vessel from 10:00 15:00 and 19:00 22:00
