Chocolate products


Crisps


The children really enjoyed the Really Big Pants Theatre show at the Community Centre. The theme was healthy eating—a subject close to our hearts here at Lowther.

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 On this page of the newsletter are some graphs and charts that we thought would be of interest to parents. As I'm sure you will be aware, children in Year 6 complete end of Primary School assessments. These assessments are known more widely as "SATs"

At Lowther we have a clear and consistent approach to how we support children in taking these assessments. We believe in encouraging hard work and enjoyment of learning. We make sure effort is rewarded and we are very clear that the focus is purely about doing your best. Our children respond fantastically to this positive and nurturing approach. The evidence of this is in our truly excellent results.

The graphs on this page show some of the results and analysis of how well our children have done at Lowther Primary School in 2018. The results show you just how high the academic standards are at Lowther, but also how much progress children from various starting points make at our fantastic school. Beside each graph is a short description of what the graph actually shows.

Mr.Bracken and I will be doing a full and detailed data presentation for all parents on our results from across the school in 2018. This will include EYFS results, Y1 phonics, end of Key Stage 1 assessments (Year2) as well as the key end of Primary assessments in Year 6. This evening will allow parents to explore the data more and to ask Mr Bracken and I any questions that they may have, The evening is planned for Tuesday 6th November 2018 from 6pm until 7pm. We hope you are able to join us.

### Graph 1

This graph shows the local context. All the Richmond and Kingston Primary schools are indicated by the clear circles. There are 65 primary schools in the data set. The Green line is the Richmond average, the purple the Kingston average and the black line is the National average. To put things into context further, Richmond is THE top attaining borough in the whole of the country—and just look where Lowther (indicated by the red arrow) sits in the borough — an incredible set of results!

Chart 2 shows the average scaled score (attainment) of pupils at Lowther in Reading and Maths combined (a key measure) in 2018. This shows that Lowther pupils on average attained a score of 109.0 on their assessments. This puts the school in the Top 5 of schools nationally. Truly impressive work by the children and all the teachers they've had over their time at Lowther. Chart 3 shows the progress measure for children in Reading and Maths in 2018. This shows that as well as incredibly high attainment Lowther children also were in the top 16% of the country's schools for progress in these two key areas.



Chart 5 shows the percentage of children at Lowther that attained the expected standard in Year 6 in all three of the core areas (Reading, Writing and Maths) The results in 2018 put us in the Top 10% of schools nationally.

The graphs that accompany Charts 2 and 5 show the school's attainment performance over the last 4 years which you can see is consistently very strong. It is worth noting the dip in 2016 was the same for all school as this was the year the assessment system changed.

Chart 4 shows the progress of pupils in Reading, Writing and Maths combined in 2018. This shows that Lowther pupils made 6% better progress in these subjects combined (not individual subjects) This means children's progress was in the top third of the country's primary schools.
